DESCENDANTS OF ABRAHAM Romans 4: 1-5, 13-17

One of the most popular songs at church camps and Vacation Bible Schools is called "Father Abraham." The lyrics go, "Father Abraham, had many sons. Many sons had Father Abraham. I am one of them and so are you, so let's all praise the Lord." Because the song also includes a whole host of silly actions and dances, you'd be forgiven for not noticing the depth of the theological point being made by the lyrics.

Yet claiming Abraham as your ancestor is most definitely making a theological point about God and about yourself.

In his letter to the Romans, the Apostle Paul argues that Abraham was saved not through works, through his adherence to the law, but rather through his faith- his trust in God. In quoting Genesis, 15: 6, Paul points out that it was before he was circumcised- a work of adherence to the law- that Abraham was justified by God, ""Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness." The decisive moment in his life, the moment when God chose, blessed, and justified Abraham came not through any work that he had done, rather it came simply through his faith- his trusting in God's promise. Abraham did nothing to merit this justification, he merely received it as a free gift.

Paul then goes on to claim that the descendants of Abraham are not only those who follow the laws of Moses, but also any one with faith- anyone who trusts in God's promise as Abraham did. So, the question before us is whether WE are children of Abraham. Do we believe that there is nothing we can do to earn the love of God? Do we believe that God freely chooses to love us even when we fall short? Do we believe that we are reconciled to God simply by trusting in God's grace and love for us? Do we believe these things not just in general, but do we believe them about ourselves specifically? If we do, then according to Paul, we are descendants of Abraham through faith- we are forgiven, we are justified, and we are loved. The promise made to Abraham, the promise that he would be a blessing to many nations, is fulfilled through our lives of faith in Jesus Christ. May we each pray for the faith to claim Abraham as our ancestor- the faith to trust in God's grace, love, and guidance. Amen.

MARCH IS MINNESOTA FOODSHARE MONTH



As announced in Spring Church Life, it's time for our annual participation in the Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign. Our congregation collects funds for Channel One Regional Food Bank and Food Shelf, and MN FoodShare raises money for a FoodFund to distribute to food shelves

statewide. The more money that Channel One receives, the larger the share of the FoodFund it will receive.

Channel One is distributing more food than ever before in the 14 counties it serves. Food shelf visits are up 33% from last year and will likely increase when the government Emergency Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (E-SNAP) payments end in March. More food has to be purchased because donated food has decreased: by 50% from USDA; by 60% from manufacturers and retailers. Inflation is causing purchased food to be more expensive than ever.

In spite of these challenges, Channel One continues and modifies its programs and services. Read about all the Channel One programs at https://www.helpingfeedpeople.org/programs/.



"THE ONE THING I KNOW"

John 9: 1-41

The 9th Chapter of John's Gospel is a work of art. It tells this magnificently ironic story where a man born blind is able to see; yet the religious authorities remain blind to the identity of Jesus who healed him. These religious authorities have already decided that Jesus cannot be the Messiah. This certainty prevents them from witnessing the miraculous power of God and giving thanks for its manifestation in Jesus. They wind up in the odd position of being opposed to a person restoring sight for the blind!

When the religious authorities question the formerly blind man about Jesus, he is unsure about the specific title appropriate for him. What he is not unsure about is that Jesus healed him. He says, "I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know,

that though I was blind, now I see." This formerly blind man will not let anyone else's opinions on Jesus' identity prevent him from proclaiming his experience of being healed by Him.

There are many ways that we at The Congregational Church UCC understand Jesus Christ, and a multiplicity of titles we use for Him: Messiah, Son of Man, Son of God, Lord, Brother, Friend, Teacher. Some of these titles may ring true for you and others may not at this point in your life. More important than any of these titles however, is the experience of being healed, helped, delivered, or saved by Jesus Christ. Those of us who have known the saving power of God's love in our lives should follow the example of the formerly blind man and cling to the truth of our experience. One thing we know, though we were blind, now we see. Trusting in God's saving help is the beginning of our journey in faith- a journey that will continually deepen our appreciation of God's work in Jesus Christ- helping us to claim him as the Son of God, the Son of Man, our Teacher, Lord, and Friend.

Ezekiel 37 - A Prayer from the Valley of Dry Bones by Sarah Myers

We remember that Yahweh led the Hebrews out of the desert, guiding them through the presence of a cloud, feeding them on manna, bringing them to a land and a legacy promised long ago. Whether in an ocean, lake, river, stream or cloud, every drop of moisture is a treasure and just so are we, God's children. It is in the desert that we understand this most clearly and directly. It is on the plain of dry bones that we learn this lesson most fully and well.

The hand of the Lord came upon me . . .

Although we may not feel it, the Lord is with us always.

And led me out in the spirit of the Lord . . .

And set me in the center of the plain . . .

Although we may not trust it, the desert is where we find solace. *How dry they were!*

Although we may not accept it, there is life where we see only death. *The Lord asks: "Can these bones come to life?*

Although we may not believe it, serenity comes through suffering.

I answer: "You alone know that".

Although we may not be certain of it, God brings good out of harm.

Thus says the Lord God to these bones: See! I will bring spirit into you, that you may come to life.

Although we may not want to admit it, we must not run away from the desert, for it is the desert that we understand the miracle of dry bones rising to new life. It is in the desert that we are surprised with new gifts. It is in the desert that we experience the awesome power and love of God. Come, let us go out to the desert so that we might meet the Lord. Amen.
